Grants for Green Schools

A few Incentive Grants are still available for the 2005-06 school year. Most of the funds for this program are from a DEQ grant. Thanks DEQ! There are a few changes: \$300 incentive grants will be given to five new schools from our target area and \$300 grants will be given to five schools (in any region) that move up to or renew at the Merit or Premier status. October Energy Awareness Day Sparks Interest

Skyrocketing energy prices drew students to Energy Awareness Day, October 6, 2005, at the Capitol. Sponsored by the Oregon Department of Energy, Salem-Keizer Transit (Cherriots), and Salem-Keizer Schools, Energy Awareness Day hosted students on field trips to the Capitol to learn how to save energy and money.

Cherriots provided free transportation to the Energy Fair. A travel trainer taught the students how to use the bus system on their own. Then the students received route maps and free tickets for rides at a later date.

At the Capitol, students climbed to the top of the tower, where they heard about and viewed the solar panels that light the Golden Pioneer on top of the Capitol. They then viewed a Car Free Day and Energy Awareness Month poster display in the Galleria.

They also visited the information booths presented by Salem Electric, Cherriots, Mid-Valley Rideshare, and the Department of Energy. A scaled-down version of a wind turbine was also on display.

Finally, the students learned about the alternative-fueled vehicles, which were parked in front of the Capitol. The Department of Energy provided a Toyota Prius and a Compressed Natural Gas car. Kettle Foods sent their Bio-Bug. Salem Electric Vehicles had a number of Neighborhood Electric Vehicles available for viewing. A Valley Vanpool van was also on display - when it wasn't shuttling its vanpool participants.

Forest Ridge's Eight Ripples...

Reduce, Reuse, Rot, Recycle, Reject, Renew, Repair, React ... will make a great wave of change

Forest Ridge Elementary and Optimum Learning Environment Charter School has just been awarded Premier Oregon Green School status. This school teaches and practices a "conservation ethic". Each grade level has a focus and actions that care for our environment.

Secretary of State, Bill Bradbury, was the featured guest speaker at the award ceremony. The event lasted all day, with demonstrations on how to: make a worm bin, make a waste-free lunch, conserve water, make suet for bird feeders, and more! Organic food tasting was provided by a local natural foods store.

Laurie Aguirre is the second grade teacher and power house behind the environmental program at Forest Ridge. Her enthusiasm is infectious. Anyone visiting the school is moved by the far-reaching impact of her program.

Sample projects at the school have been: a "Renew-Reuse" center operated by students and parents in which items in good condition will be taken in for trade or

transferred to others in need; each student receives a "Kids Care Kit" which contains items that help protect water quality and promote water conservation; students operate monitoring teams during lunch to promote "Take what you eat - Eat what you take" and encourages waste free lunch containers; classes provide outreach to community businesses to encourage them to buy recycled content products and reduce excessive packaging; wormi-vermi-composting lessons have helped students and the public begin composting their food waste.

The students at Forest Ridge have mentored other schools to assist them in becoming green schools, they have presented lessons at OMSI and the Oregon Green Schools Summit, and they have made presentations to the Salem-Keizer School Districts board members.

Congratulations to Forest Ridge Elementary and Optimum Learning Environment Charter School for making a difference for our environment.
